Learning outcomes	<p>At the end of the Programme, students should:</p> <p>(LO1). Understand the different disciplinary approaches on social sciences and humanities in relation to European integration, including the way in which the different disciplines interact and enrich each other on the added-value of multidisciplinary knowledge to understand Europe.</p> <p>(LO2). Have multidisciplinary knowledge on the fundamental aspects and values of the European Union and European integration, which allows students to grasp, Europe as a political, economic, cultural and societal process in past and present times.</p> <p>(LO4). Be able to grasp the need for a general knowledge of different conceptual, theoretical and methodological perspectives to analyze and understand the European Union.</p>
Course objectives	<p>At the end of this course students will be able to:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Acquire a general knowledge about the state of the art and the historiographical debates raised by the historical problems of the period covered by the subject. - Provide the student with analytical instruments -conceptual and methodological- that allow an approach to European integration as an open history of the present time, in which the last word has not yet been said. - Familiarize the student with new historiographic approaches in the field of International History / History of International Relations such as Global History or Transnational History so as to provide a different view towards European integration from different angles. - Facilitate an adequate understanding of the historical process in which European construction is framed, based on the analysis of the European narrative, the role of acculturation and Europeanization processes or the different readings offered on the European public space in its supranational dimension.
