Introduction

- 11 million displaced and 300,000 killed Syrians
- 4,835,909 registered refugees in the region (2 May 2016)
- 972,012 asylum seekers in Europe (between Apr 2011 and Feb 2016)
- Ca. 500,000 of university age (18-22)
- Very low ratio of enrollment (25% compared with pre-war Syria)
- "Future in the balance" (NRC)









Obstacles to Higher Education for Syrian refugees

- Information on university systems and available opportunities
- Acceptance of previous educational achievements
- Financial burden (tuition fees etc.)
- Legal aspects
- Lack of awareness/understanding and suitable academic and social offers
- Language barriers; lack of adequate academic preparation
- Trauma & mental stress

WP 1: Education Counselling & Scholarship Fund

Syria Education Desks

Individual counselling and personal advice in all five countries of the action

Establishment of Scholarship Fund

- Full scholarships (tuition fees & living allowance)
- Undergraduate & graduates studies; all disciplines eligible
- Ongoing assistance by Syria Education Desks
- Open to vulnerable youth from host communities

Strategic partnerships

 Coordination, if possible harmonization with existing initiatives; cooperation with experienced partners (UNHCR, YTB, GJU) in order to avoid irritation and competition and to optimize results









WP 2: The Higher Education English Access Programme (HEEAP)

The need for English in Higher Education

- Lebanon: Most Syrians lack English proficiency and this limits their choices and forces them to join faculties that only use Arabic
- Turkey: A lack of English is a major barrier to the refugee students with numerous university departments teaching exclusively in English
- Jordan: English proficiency is a requirement for entry into all Bachelors and Masters programmes
- Egypt: Egyptian students study English from grade 3 compared to Syrian students who start at grade 6 ... (For) many university subjects, English proficiency is used as selection criteria at enrolment

WP 2: The Higher Education English Access Programme (HEEAP)

HEEAP English Access Programme:

Outreach 4,000 people over four years in Egypt, Jordan, Lebanon and Turkey

English programmes to be set up with partner universities in each country

English Access Programme Coordinator in each country - link between Education Officers, Universities and the British Council

Courses tailored to the context of each country and education system









WP 2: The Higher Education English Access Programme (HEEAP)

Different groups needing academic English support to be identified in each country, e.g.

- Currently enrolled students needing English support
- Syrian academics needing enhanced English skills
- Potential HE students lacking necessary English skills

English programme components

- Assessment the Aptis test
- Online course focusing on academic English of English for employability
- Teacher training for partner universities on blended learning









WP 3: Calls for Proposals for Short Projects

Call for Proposals (CfP)

- Design and manage CfP for local stakeholders in the whole target region to implement short projects.
- Focus on credit-based short courses as well as on flexible, creative learning interventions

Establishment of Call for Proposals

- Financing to a maximum of 60,000 Euro
- 35-40 projects financed in both Call for Proposals
- Tailor made to benefit target group (f.e. MOOCs in refugee camps, Trainings for lecturers on didactics and methodology, Summer or Winter school, Training of education staff in dealing with traumatized students etc.)





Mapping and Analysis

 Development of an online catalogue of study programmes for Syrian students, linking in to existing initiatives

Policy Dialogue and Networking Events

 Organization of 2 regional conferences (Amman, 2017 and Beirut, 2018) and of national stakeholder meetings in all five target countries

Programme Website

Will contain up-to-date information for students and stakeholders on all project activities

Promotion and Dissemination

Student-focused promotional campaigns including social media and institutional communication









Expected Results

- Better information about existing opportunities
- Better understanding of refugees' situation and specific needs
- Improved capacity of young Syrians to access higher education
- Better coordination of activities through stakeholder dialogue
- Improving the situation at host institutions
- More Syrian students enrolled in higher education
