

## QUOTES AND BIBLIOGRAPHY

The quotes and references system is based on *The Chicago Manual Style* (17<sup>th</sup> edition) and the *Manual de Estilo Chicago-Deusto*.

On occasions, the numbered reference (or Vancouver system) will be accepted for biomedical sciences, the rules of the Institute of Electrical and Electronical Engineers (IEEE) for engineering and the American Chemical Society (ACS) style for chemical sciences.

In any case, the author or editor of a collective volume will be responsible for unifying both the quotes within the text and the list of bibliographic references at the end of the book or chapter according to the references system followed.

Authors must follow the citation guidelines compiled in the 17th edition of the Chicago Manual of Style (CMS), adhering to the system of their choice when formatting quotes (i.e. author-date system or the bibliography and notes system):

## 1. AUTHOR-DATE

### 1.1. QUOTES IN THE TEXT

The work is cited in abbreviated form within the text under the author-date system, indicating the surname(s) of the author, the year of publication of the work and, if necessary, the page number between round brackets. If the surname(s) of the quoted author was (were) recently indicated in the text, only the date is needed between round brackets for any subsequent quotes in the text.

For example:

Especificar cuáles son las funciones del sistema de puntuación es aún más difícil si consideramos, además, que ni siquiera está cerrada la nómina de los elementos que integran el sistema (Rosselló 2008). La cuestión de cuántos son los signos de puntuación y en qué tipos se pueden subdividir, en virtud de su función, o de su nuclearidad, es relativamente habitual, según Cassany (1999).

Works by the same author in the same year should be differentiated by adding a lower-case letter.

For example:

(Chaume Varela 2004a, 45-46).

(Chaume Varela 2004b, 356).

When the date of publication of a work cannot be determined, the abbreviation (n.d.) takes the place of the year.

For example:

(Nano, n.d.)

Works accepted for publication with an unknown publication date must use "in press" instead of a date.

For example:

(Sánchez Iglesias, in press)

For unknown authors, a shortened version of the title can be used without including the initial article.

For example:

(*Colección de las particularidades* 1796)

When the work is identified by the pseudonym of the author, this should be included instead of their surname.

For example:

(Azorín 1905)

When an institution becomes the author of a work, an abbreviation should be included.

For example:

(ILO 2007)

## 1.2. LIST OF REFERENCES

The corresponding full bibliographic reference is included in a list at the end of the document. References should be ordered alphabetically, with hanging indentation.

For example:

Cassany, Daniel. 1999. "Puntuación: Investigaciones, concepciones y didáctica". *Letras* 58: 21-54.

Rosselló Verdeguer, Jorge. 2008. "El aprendizaje de los signos de puntuación a través de los libros de estilo". *Textos de didáctica de la lengua y la literatura* 49, no. 3: 111-121.

If several works by the same author are going to be referenced, the name and surname(s) are indicated in each case and they are ordered by year of publication. Undated (n.d.) or "in press" works are listed after the dated works.

For example:

Segura Munguía, Santiago. 2005. *Los jardines en la Antigüedad*. Bilbao: Universidad de Deusto.

Segura Munguía, Santiago. 2007. *Diccionario por raíces del latín y de las voces derivadas*. Bilbao: Universidad de Deusto.

Segura Munguía, Santiago. 2010. *Nuevo diccionario etimológico latín-español y de las voces derivadas*. Bilbao: Universidad de Deusto.

Works by the same author should be differentiated by adding a lower case letter and ordered alphabetically by the title.

For example:

Chaume Varela, Frederic. 2004a. *Cine y traducción*. Cátedra: Madrid.

Chaume Varela, Frederic. 2004b. "Modelos de investigación en traducción audiovisual". *Íkala, Revista de Lenguaje y Cultura* 9, no. 15: 351-365.

When the date of publication of a work cannot be determined, the abbreviation (n.d.) takes the place of the year.

For example:

Nano, Jasmine L. n.d. *Title of the work*

Works accepted for publication with an unknown publication date must use "in press" instead of a date.

For example:

Sánchez Iglesias, Jorge. In press. "Norma y estilo en la fase de revisión". In *Un espacio de confluencias: Traducción, edición y corrección*, edited by Esther Monzó. Seville: Arcibel.

If the author is unknown, the entry in the list of references should begin with the title. In cases where the title begins with an article, this should not be considered for alphabetization.

For example:

*Colección de las particularidades de la vida y muerte de un pretendido filósofo moderno*. 1796. Madrid.

When the reference includes the pseudonym of the author, this should precede the full name in square brackets.

For example:

Azorín [José Martínez Ruiz]. 1905. *Los pueblos (Ensayos sobre la vida provinciana)*. Madrid: Biblioteca Nacional y Extranjera.

If a work published by an institution lacks an author name, the institution can appear as the author. The reference should include the abbreviated and full names of the organization.

For example:

ILO (International Labour Office). 2007. *Convenio número 169 sobre pueblos indígenas y tribales: Un manual*. Geneva: ILO.

## **Journal articles**

### **(Single authorship)**

In-text quotation:

For example:

(Gielen 1994, 784)

Bibliography model: Author Surname(s), Name. Year. "Name of the Article". *Title of the journal* volume of the journal, no. of the journal: pages on which the article appears.

For example:

Gielen, Arthur. 1994. "Interpersonal Conflict and Physical Violence". *Social Science and Medicine* 39, no. 6: 781-787.

### **(Two or three authorships)**

In-text quotation:

For example:

(Graham and Jones 2019, 442)

(Cheng, Smith and López 2000, 94)

Bibliography model: Author 1 Surname(s), Name, Author 2 Name Surname(s), and Author 3 Name Surname(s). Year. "Name of the Article". *Title of the journal* volume of the journal, no. of the journal: pages on which the article appears.

For example:

González Pascual, Julián, and Marta López Serrano. 2012. "La relación laboral en los concursos de acreedores". *Información Comercial Española. Revista de Economía*, no. 866: 153-172.

Lipsky, Sarah, Alice Holt and Roberta Easterling. 2005. "Police-Reported Intimate Partner Violence during Pregnancy: Who is at Risk?". *Violence and Victims* 20, no. 1: 69-86.

### **(Between four and ten authorships)**

In-text quotation:

Bibliography model: Author 1 Surname(s), Name, Author 2 Name Surname(s), Author 3 Name Surname(s), and Author X Name Surname(s). Year. "Name of the Article". *Title of the journal* volume of the journal, no. of the journal: pages on which the article appears.

Arseneault, Linda, Ron Tremblay, Marie Jones, Brendan Boulerice, and Jane Saucier. 2002. "Obstetrical Complications and Violent Delinquency: Testing Two Developmental Pathways". *Child Development* 73, no. 2: 496-508.

### **(More than ten authorships)**

For more than ten authorships, the first seven are listed in the bibliography followed by *et al.*

## **Books**

### **(Single authorship)**

In-text quotation:

For example:

(Shabot 2019, 85)

Bibliography model: Author Surname(s), Name. Year. *Title of the book*. City: Publisher.

For example:

Shabot, Alice. 2019. *Amigas, Sisters: We're being Gaslighted*. Basingstoke: Macmillan.

### **(Two to three authorships)**

In-text quotation:

For example:

(Alvar, Mainer and Navarro 1997)

Bibliography model: Author 1 Surname(s), Name, Author 2 Name Surname(s), and Author 3 Name Surname(s). Year. *Title of the book*. City: Publisher.

For example:

Alvar, Carlos, José Carlos Mainer, and Rosa Navarro. 1997. *Breve historia de la literatura española*. Madrid: Alianza.

### **(Four to ten authorships)**

In-text quotation:

Bibliography model: Author 1 Surname(s), Name, Author 2 Name Surname(s), Author 3 Name Surname(s) and Author X Name Surname(s). Year. *Title of the book*. City: Publisher.

### **(More than ten authorships)**

For more than ten authorships, the first seven are listed in the bibliography followed by *et al.*

In-text quotation:

For example:

(Domínguez Monedero et al. 1999)

Bibliography model: Author 1 Surname(s), Name, Author 2 Name Surname(s), Author 3 Name Surname(s), and Author X Name Surname(s). Year. *Title of the book*. City: Publisher.

### **(Citing an editor, translator or coordinator instead of author)**

Additionally, if an editor, translator or coordinator is to be cited instead of the author, the bibliographical entry should be formatted as follows:

Surname(s), Name, ed. / trans. / coord. Year. *Title of the book*. City: Publisher.

For example:

Notario Ruiz, Antonio, ed. 2005. *Contrapuntos estéticos*. Salamanca: Ediciones Universidad de Salamanca.

### **Book chapters**

In-text quotation:

For example:

(Braqui 2020, 52)

Bibliography model: Author Surname(s), Name. Year. "Title of the chapter". In *Title of the book*, ed. by Editor Name Surname(s), pages on which the chapter appears. City: Publisher.

For example:

Braqui, Margarita. 2020. "Radiografía de un experimento sociológico". In *Feminismo 2.0*, ed. by Luis Santos, 27-63. Barcelona: Ínsula.

For two or more authorships, the rules for books and journal articles should be followed.

Prefaces, prologues, introductions or similar sections of a work should be cited as follows:

Author Surname(s), Name. Year. Introduction / Preface / Prologue to *Title of the book*, ed. by Editor Name Surname(s), pages on which the chapter appears. City: Publisher.

For example:

Rieger, James. 1982. Introduction to *Frankenstein; or, The Modern Prometheus*, by Mary Wollstonecraft Shelley, XI-XXXVII. Chicago: University of Chicago Press.

If the cited work is an edited or coordinated book, the information concerning the editor should be formatted as in the book chapter's entry.

For example:

Gómez Sanz, Jorge Jesús. 2022. Preface to Jornada «Aprendizaje Eficaz con TIC en la UCM», coord. by Luis Hernández Yáñez, 15-16. Madrid: Ediciones Complutense.

### **Websites**

In-text quotation:

For example: (Sabín 2017)

Bibliography model: Author Surname(s), Name. Year. "Title of the article". *Title of the website*. Date of consultation/modification of the resource. URL of the resource.

For example:

Sabín, Carlos. 2017. "No, Wigner no pensaba eso". *Investigación y Ciencia: Cuantos completos*. Last modified on 17 April 2017.  
<https://www.investigacionyciencia.es/blogs/fisica-y-quimica/85/posts/no-wigner-no-pensaba-eso-17931>.

For two or more authorships, the rules for books and journal articles should be followed.

## Academic works

In-text quotation:

For example:

(Hernán de la Hoz 1968)

Bibliography model: Author Surname(s), Name. Year. "Title of the dissertation". Doctoral dissertation / Master's Degree dissertation / Bachelor's Degree dissertation. University at which it was produced.

For example:

Hernán de la Hoz, Felicitas. 1968. "Las fronteras del negacionismo en un ecosistema racionalista. Problemática asociada a las comunidades indígenas". Doctoral dissertation. Universidad de Murcia.

## Conference presentations

In-text quotation:

For example:

(Chaparro 1999, 12-13)

Bibliography model: Author Surname(s), Name. Year. "Title of the communication". Communication presented at *Title of the conference*, Location of the conference, date of the conference (excluding year).

For example:

Chaparro, Ana. 1999. "La mirada y la memoria: historia compartida catalanoaragonesa". Communication presented at the *2nd Conference on Alternative History*, Belchite, 15-17 May.

For two or more authorships, the rules for books and journal articles should be followed.

## 2. NOTES AND BIBLIOGRAPHY

### 2.1. CITATIONS AND NOTES

When a work is quoted, the main bibliographic data for the document are indicated in a note using superscript numbers in the page footer or at the end of the chapter.

For example:

If the same work is going to be quoted later on, the successive notes need only refer to the reference in an abbreviated form. This should include the surname(s) of the author, without such abbreviations as ed. or trans., and the first words of the title if this contains more than four. When there are more than three authorships for the work, the surname(s) of the first is (are) followed by “et al”.

For example:

<sup>2</sup> Arseneault et al., “Obstetrical Complications”, 499.

The corresponding full bibliographic reference is included in a list at the end of the document. References should be ordered alphabetically, with hanging indentation. If several works by the same author are going to be referenced, the name and surname(s) are indicated in each case and they are ordered by year of publication. Undated (n.d.) or “in press” works are listed after the dated works.

For example:

Segura Munguía, Santiago. *Los jardines en la Antigüedad*. Bilbao: Universidad de Deusto, 2005.

Segura Munguía, Santiago. *Diccionario por raíces del latín y de las voces derivadas*. Bilbao: Universidad de Deusto, 2007.

When two or more studies from the same year by a single authorship are quoted, they should be listed alphabetically.

For example:

García Yebra, Valentín. *El realismo metódico*. Barcelona: Estudios Editorial, 1991.

García Yebra, Valentín. *Religiosidad popular en la Alta Edad Media*. Granada: Anuario, 1991.

### 2.2. BIBLIOGRAPHY

#### Journal articles

The specific page number being quoted should be included in the page footer or at the end of the chapter. The pages on which the full article appears should be included in the bibliography.

For articles consulted online, the DOI, URL or name of the database should be included. In the case of various authorships, the rules for printed journals are followed.

Note model: Author Name Surname(s), "Title of the article", *Title of the journal* volume of the journal, no. of the journal (Year of publication): pages from which the quote is taken, DOI or URL of the resource.

Bibliography model: Author Surname(s), Name, "Title of the article", *Title of the journal* volume of the journal, no. of the journal (Year of publication): pages on which the article appears, DOI or URL of the resource.

For example:

#### **Special editions, supplements, annexes**

Articles contained in a special edition, supplement or annex should be quoted in the following manner.

Note model: Author Name Surname(s), "Title of the article", in "Title of the special edition", ed. / coord. Editor/coordinator Name Surname(s), number of the special edition / supplement / annex, *Title of the journal* volume of the journal, no. of the journal (Year of publication): pages from which the quote is taken.

Bibliography model: Author Surname(s), Name, "Title of the article". In "Title of the special edition", edited / coordinated by Editor/Coordinator Name Surname(s). Number of the special edition / Supplement / Annex, *Title of the journal in italics* volume of the journal, no. of the journal (Year of publication): first and last page of the article.

For example:

**Note:** Sharon Sassler, "Learning to Be an 'American lady? Ethnic Variation in Daughters' Pursuits in the Early 1900s", in "Emergent and Reconfigured Forms of Family Life", ed. Bibliography model: Author Surname(s), Name. *Title of the book*. Edition. Volume. City: Publisher, Year of publication. DOI or URL of the resource.

For example:

The specific pages are quoted in the note but the page range of the chapter is quoted in the bibliography. Digital book chapters can include a DOI.

from which the quote is taken.

Bibliography model: Author 1 Surname(s), Name. "Title of the chapter". In *Title of the book*, edited/coordinated by Editor/Coordinator Name Surname(s), pages on which the chapter appears. City: Publisher, Year of publication.

## Legislation and jurisprudence

In academic texts, these are mentioned in both the body of the text and in a note.

Note model: Type of regulation number/year, of day month, on full name of the regulation (Location and date of publication).

Spanish Constitutional Law 8/1980, of 22 September, on Regional Government Financing, (OSG no. 236 of 1 October 1980), hereinafter LOFCA.

Spanish Law 14/2007, of 26 November, on Historic Heritage in Andalusia (Official Gazette of Andalusia no. 248 of 19 December 2007).

Spanish Royal Decree 1065/2007, of 27 July, approving the General Regulations governing tax inspection and management actions and procedure and developing the common regulations governing procedures applicable to taxation (OSG no. 213 of 5 September 2007).

Jurisprudence should be quoted making reference to the ruling body, the number and the date, using abbreviations for the ruling term and the mention of the ruling body.

For example:

The text from the STC 185/2012, of 17 October, states, in its preamble...

This means, according to the STC 11/1981, that workers have a right to exercise...

## Manuscripts

A note should be used to indicate the specific document (letter, royal decree of grace, royal provision, memorandum, telegram, report, etc.). The list of references should include the document group to which the manuscript belongs.

Generally speaking, such abbreviations as the following should be used: ms./mss. (manuscript/s), p./pp. (page/s), fol./fols. (folio/s), doc./docs. (document/s), no./s (número/s), v. (verse), p (passage), d (docket), f (file).

Note model: Author Name and Surname(s) of the document **to** Recipient of the document, Type of document, Date of the document, Name of the document group, Signature, Institution, Location.

Bibliography model: Name of the document group. Institution. Location.

For example:

**Note:** Burton to Merrian, telegram, 26 January 1923, Charles E. Merrian Papers, University of Chicago Library.

**Abbreviated note:** Burto to Merrian, telegram.

**Bibliography entry:** Charles E. Merriam Papers. University of Chicago Library.

## Websites

If the website does not indicate the date of publication or review, the date of access should be included.

Bibliography model: *Name of the website*. Consulted on date of consultation. URL of the resource.

Quotes from blog entries usually only appear in a note. If a blog is quoted frequently, it may be included in the bibliography.

Note model: Author Name Surname(s), "Title of the entry between inverted commas", *Title of the blog* (blog), date of publication, URL of the resource.

Bibliography model: *Title of the blog in italics (blog)*. URL of the resource.

For example:

## Dictionaries and enciclopedias

These works are usually quoted in a note. The publication data (editorial footnote) are omitted but the edition should be specified if it is not the first. The item or entry should be quoted (not the volume or page number) preceded by s. v. (*sub verbo*); plural s. vv.).

For example:

*Encyclopaedia Britannica*, 15th ed., s. v. "salvation".

RAE, *Diccionario de la Real Academia de la Lengua Española*, 22nd ed. (CD-ROM), s.v. "anatematizar".

*Dictionary of American Biography*, s. v. "Wadsworth, Jeremiah".

### ► Online dictionaries and enciclopedias

Online versions of encyclopaedias and dictionaries should be quoted in the same manner as printed versions. If there is no date of review or publication for the entry being quoted, include the date of access.

For example:

*Wikipedia*, s. v. "Filiberto Villalobos", last modified on 16 July 2012, [http://es.wikipedia.org/wiki/Filiberto\\_Villalobos](http://es.wikipedia.org/wiki/Filiberto_Villalobos).

*Enciclopedia libre universal en español*, s. v. "bioética", accessed on 30 November 2009, <http://enciclopedia.us.es>.

*Encyclopaedia Britannica Online*, s. v. "Sibelius, Jean", accessed on 19 July 2008, <http://original.britannica.com/eb/article-9067596>.

*Grove Music Online*, s. v. "Toscanini, Arturo", by David Cairns, accessed on 19 July 2008, <http://www.oxfordmusiconline.com/>.

When the entries have an author signature, they should be quoted as a collective work. These quotes can be included in the bibliography.

For example:

### Classical greco-latin and mediaeval works

References to primary classical sources are made in the text or a note. They are only included in the bibliography when referencing information or an annotation provided by a modern author.

For example:

"The period of 80 days of inactivity by the Peloponnesian fleet in Rhodes referred to by Thucydides (8.44.4)..."

#### ► Abbreviations in references to classical works

The most common pattern in this regard is the list of abbreviations included in the *Index Scriptorum Latinorum*.
