About the special section in the Journal of World Economy

The special section aims to contribute to concrete and contextual knowledge on structural trends and industrial policies: the knowledge necessary to promote selective policies that make it possible to undertake 'missions' with some effectiveness. Thus it presents five works, the first of which introduces the section with an overview of the former dearth and late resurgence of sectoral concerns and of industrial policy. The remaining four works focus on specific geographical areas – the European Union, East Asia, Spain, and the U.S. – addressing diverse relevant aspects of the question that occupies this section: public promotional banking and finance; State-business relations in industrial policy; the evaluation of a specific productive-export structure; and the consequences of deindustrialization in terms of productivity.

About the EPM research group

The research group on Global Political Economy (EPM in its Spanish acronym) aims to analyze the dynamics of growth and structural change that take place in key spaces of the world economy, in a context of commercial, productive, and financial interdependence. Analyses are carried out with a political economy approach, in which distribution and institutions become a central part of economic research.
